

State Gymanfa Ganu: Our Talented Director

Rev. Joseph G. Corbin. Retired in 2020 after 41 years in church related work, 28 years as an ordained minister, he now serves as a supply pastor, most recently for 2.5 years at First Presbyterian Church Weyauwega, WI.

On Sunday May 5, 9:00 a.m, Joe will preach at the First

Presbyterian Church Baraboo prior to this year's gymanfa.

Joe received his formal training at The University of Wisconsin, School of Music, where he studied vocal performance. He earned a B.A. in Music and a M. Div. degree from The University of Dubuque, Iowa.

Joe is well-known for directing Cymanfaoedd Canu and St. David's Day festivities throughout Colorado, Illinois, Minnesota, Nebraska, Ohio, Pennsylvania, and Wisconsin. He has also helped lead many of the late-night informal sings at NAFOW gatherings.

In fall 2024 he will direct in Mankato MN and Oak Hill OH.

Joe serves as a board member on the Welsh North American Association, the Welsh Gymanfa Ganu Association of Wisconsin and the Peniel Welsh Chapel Association.

2024 Eisteddfod

We welcome your entries for this year's Eisteddfod! The theme for this year is "Circus/Syrcas" or "Circle of Life/Cylch Bywyd." You may submit entries in any of the categories of competition: Visual Arts, Literary Arts, Recitation, and Music. (See **General Rules for Submissions** and **Deadlines for Submissions** below for details.)

- The **Literary Arts** category includes original poems (50 lines or less) and essays (750 words or less).
- The Visual Arts category includes, but is not limited to: original paintings, photography, ceramics, textiles, and sculpture.
- The **Recitation** category consists of recitation of the poem "The Circus" delivered in English or "Y Dychweliad" delivered in Welsh, and may be read or memorized. Text will be sent when you register (see Registration below).
- The **Music** category may include voice and/or instrumental on one piece, limited to a maximum of six minutes.

Prizes

All entries are judged on the criteria of how well they capture the theme of "Circus/Syrcas" or "Circle of Life/Cylch Bywyd," the extent to which they incorporate Welsh components, and the quality of the work. Winners are determined by adjudication, except for the Visual Arts category, in which the winner receives the most votes cast by attendees at the weekend.

- The **Literary Arts** winner receives the Bardic Chair, the highest honor.
- The **Visual Arts** winner receives the Crown prize.
- The **Recitation** winner receives the Love Spoon prize.
- The **Music** winner receives the Baton prize.

Winners must be present at the Eisteddfod ceremony on Saturday at the First Presbyterian Church in Baraboo to receive their prizes. The Eisteddfod Committee acknowledges the significant thought, effort, and time that goes into the creation and performance of the submissions, and all entrants will be recognized and thanked for their efforts.

General Rules for Submissions

Competitions will take place late Saturday afternoon at the First Presbyterian Church in Baraboo. See Deadlines for Submissions below.

- In **Literary Arts** you must submit your entry using a pseudonym (*ffugenw*) rather than your actual name. Entries must be original, created specifically for the Eisteddfod. Poems must be 50 lines or less, in English or Welsh. Essays must be 750 words or less, in English or Welsh.
- Visual Arts submissions must be created specifically for this competition, with the theme "Circus/Syrcas" or "Circle of Life/Cylch Bywyd." Media can be paintings, drawings, photography, ceramics, textile items (quilts, fiber crafts, knitting, weavings, etc.), or sculpture. Submit a brief description of how the piece was created and how it is connected to the "Circus/Syrcas" or "Circle of Life/Cylch Bywyd" theme. (See Deadlines for Submissions below.)
- **Recitation** performers will deliver the poem "The Circus" in English or "Y Dychweliad" in Welsh, from memory or by reading. Text will be sent to you after you send in your registration (see Deadlines for Submissions below). Recitations will be late Saturday afternoon at the church.
- In the **Music** category soloists or groups may sing and/or play instruments. Please send in music in advance if an accompanist is needed (see Deadlines for Submissions). Performances will take place during the Eisteddfod on Saturday afternoon.

NOTE: If you wish, you may drop off your Visual Arts entry at the church at 1:00 p.m. on Saturday.

Literary Arts and Visual Arts entries will be displayed on Saturday afternoon and Sunday at the First Presbyterian Church. Winners will be announced during the Eisteddfod Ceremony on Saturday afternoon at the church.

Submit Literary Arts entries, Music selections, and Visual Arts descriptions no later than midnight, April 28, 2024 to Bron Wentzel (crawfishcats@netwurx.net). Recitation competitors are urged to notify Bron of your intention to compete so that copies of the text can reach you beforehand.

The Cambria Gymanfa Ganu board is pleased to announce the selection of Kathy Crusi as director of its 79th annual gymanfa ganu.


At the North American Festival of Wales in Philadelphia in 2022, Kathy was a featured soloist at the opening concert and the gymanfa ganu sessions, and she also directed the late-night hymn singing.

Kathy is a graduate of The University of Akron with a Master of Music in Vocal Performance. She has appeared frequently at events for The Welsh Society of Philadelphia. In 2018 she won the David Morris Award at the North American Festival of Wales eisteddfod competition which gave her the privilege of competing in the Welsh National Eisteddfod in Llanrwst, Wales in 2019. For the past 24 years Kathy has taught private voice lessons and was the recipient of "One of the Top 12 Best Voice Teachers in Philadelphia" for the last eight years in a row.

She recently wrote and recorded a Christmas song, "Silently She Waited," which can be enjoyed on YouTube. It has beautiful videography and was sung in three voices; probably all sung by her through the magic of technology. Her wonderful recordings of "Breath of Heaven" and "Ave Maria" are also available.

Nine years ago, Kathy didn't even know what a gymanfa ganu was. Since then, she has jumped into the Welsh world with both feet, discovering her Welsh heritage on her father's side. Her great-great-grandfather was a coal miner who came to Pottsville, Pennsylvania. Now she's learning to sing in Welsh and has a repertoire of Welsh solos.

We look forward to Cambria's Gymanfa Ganu and her leadership. And yes, she will sing a few solos for us. Join us on October 13, 2024 at Cambria First Presbyterian Church, 121 West Florence Street, Cambria, WI.

2023 Christmas Gymanfa Ganu

On November 12, the Welsh Gymanfa Ganu Association of Wisconsin (WGGAW) held its annual Christmas Gymanfa Ganu at the First Congregational United Church of Christ in Redgranite. Rev. Jennifer Czarnota provided a welcome and devotions for the afternoon and WGGAW's Dale Hughes was the session moderator.

This year we celebrated the contributions and memory of Edward D. and Barbara Jane Jones, who were very involved members of the church and encouraged the WGGAW to hold an annual gymanfa ganu there. The first was held in 2001.

Ed and Barb were both descendants of farm families that



emigrated from Wales in the 1800s. Ed, a veteran who piloted B-17s during WWII, earned a PhD in Plant Pathology. He established the Uihlein Seed Potato Research Farm near Lake Placid, NY during his career at Cornell University. Barb earned a BS/RN degree. She worked in the same field

as Ed while raising their four children in Ithaca, NY. In retirement, they returned to central Wisconsin and settled on Big Hills Lake.

During the gymanfa ganu, their son David Rees Jones presented recollections of his parents and family life. Respect was a big element in their growing up. His sisters and brother, and Barb's sister Sandy Jones Stanicek, were in attendance, as were their children and grandchildren.



About half of our songs were in the church's hymnal

(many were Welsh) and the rest were from the WGGAW Christmas hymnal. Three of the songs had descants led by Lori Page, our soloist, who chose to play the clarinet on "Good Christian Men, Rejoice." Lori also sang "Bless This House" and "Gesu Bambino" accompanied by Ann. On "Watcher, Tell Us of The Night" (Aberystwyth), Ann divided us into two groups and had us face each other. One side sang lines one and three and the other side sang lines two and four. So, the song came alive with the Traveler talking to the Watcher and the Watcher responding to the Traveler.

Ann brought out her large hand-held drum which she made under the direction of a Native American. It had a bass sound. We then sang "Twas in The Moon of Wintertime," the Huron carol, while she led us softly playing the drum. She explained that the song was written by a Jesuit priest to tell the Christmas story in Native American terms. Mighty Gitchi Manitu, Rabbit skins, beaver pelts... etc. It was sung in unison with the men on verse two and the women on verse three and all on verse four with a haunting descant in the hymnbook sung by Lori. Very effective. A new favorite for many of us. Of course, we sang Stille Nacht in German, English and Welsh and the third verse a cappella.

Hymns were organized by Thanksgiving, Advent, Christmas, and Angel Proclamation and ended with Diadem at the request of the Ed and Barbara Jones family. "Deck the Hall" was sung after the benediction.

The te bach in the fellowship hall left us wanting for nothing – there were plenty of sandwiches, accompaniments, and sweet treats to overfeed us for our journey home. Tea, coffee and lemonade flowed.

The Jones family had several displays of their family memorabilia as well as a slide show of family pictures, including their early Welsh ancestors who settled in central and southwestern Wisconsin. There was a surprise free drawing for a basket of Welsh goodies provided by Linda Evans.

Many thanks to Dale Hughes for initiating and planning this event; Sandy Jones Stanicek and the Jones family for organizing the recollections of Ed and Barb and setting up the presentation; Jenny and her church crew for a wonderful te bach; and to Ann, Tom and Lori for sharing their musical talents.

2023 Welsh Weekend

The Welsh Gymanfa Ganu Association of Wisconsin, Inc. (WGGAW) held its traditional Welsh weekend the first weekend in May.

Those who were able to obtain tickets gathered at All Saints' Cathedral in Milwaukee for an early Afternoon High Tea. What a treat!

At 4:00 p.m. we met at nearby Immanuel Presbyterian Church for Welsh events. Gwenith Closs-Colgrove of Lincoln, Nebraska opened the afternoon's activities with a talk about the Great Plains Welsh Heritage Project, home of the Archive for Welsh America in Wymore, Nebraska. She also extended an invitation to everyone to attend the North American Festival of Wales which will be held in Lincoln, Nebraska this upcoming Labor Day weekend.

Carolee Schultz presented updates about the improvements to Peniel Welsh Chapel near Oshkosh, the success of last year's 100th gymanfa ganu anniversary, and invited everyone to come to the events they have planned for this year.

Next on the agenda was an eisteddfod based on the theme Dŵr/Water. This theme was suggested by the late Mary Williams-Norton, a WGGAW board member, and we held this year's competitions in her honor.

There was one entry in the Recitation category, Rev. Joe Corbin of Omro, and his presentation of "Pentref Llanfihangel" in Welsh was deemed worthy of a prize. We had two

competitors in the Music category. Rev.

Joe Corbin sang "Rock of Ages" in Welsh while accompanying himself on the guitar. Florence Case of Antigo, which is in the northeast corner of Wisconsin, attended with her three daughters. She sang "Songs of the Night." Florence was the winner of The Baton. There were two entries in Visual Arts - "Waves of Welsh," a painting by Kim Corbin, and a moody black and white photo of a nearby marsh by Ann Lemmenes. Kim was the winner of The Crown for this category.

The Chair, awarded for the Literary category, is the most coveted. This vear's chair was procured by Bron Wentzel, lovingly

restored, and adorned with daffodils on its on the seat. Entries

were submitted under a pseudonym (ffugenw). Competitor Cymreig Bachgen Buwch (Bron Wentzel) submitted a prose entry in English – "What is the Weight of Water" and competitor Yr Un Sy'n Caru Coffi Bore (Kim Corbin) contributed the poem "Welsh Water of Wisconsin." In a ceremony that can only compare to the most solemn at the National Eisteddfod, Kim was presented her chair amidst cries of Heddwch/Peace! Robert Humphries made the announcement and Danny Proud and Rhys Humphries held the sword and scabbard.

North American Festival of Wales August 28-September 1, 2024 in Pittsburgh PA

In 2024, the North American Festival of Wales returns to Pittsburgh, PA. A fantastic lineup of entertainment, seminars, competitions, tours and other activities await you!

On Wednesday evening, there is a special event 'Call Mr. Robeson' presented by Nigerian-born Tayo Aluko. Paul Robeson was a famous actor, singer and civil rights campaigner. As Mr. Robeson became more radical and outspoken, he found a strong connection with the Welsh, championing their protests of poverty and destitution.

The Thursday evening Welcome Concert is headlined by Mal Pope, a well-known television host, personality and performer born in Brynhyfryd, Swansea, Wales. He shares stories of his friendship with Elton John and other notables in the arts during his Golden Anniversary in the entertainment business.

There's isn't anything much better than a Male Voice Choir—unless it's two of them! The Côr Meibion Aberhonddu (Brecon Male Choir) and Côr Meibion Dyfnant (Dunvant Male Choir) share their talents over the course of the festival weekend.

Solo talent includes Mared, from Llannefydd in North Wales. In 2021 Mared's debut bilingual folk/pop album, 'Y Drefn,' was awarded Welsh Album of The Year. Since then she has performed her original music with the BBC National Orchestra of Wales, at Sony Hall in New York and, with her band, to sold-out shows across London and Wales.

Festival tours include a "City of Steel Highlight" tour on the Explorer, the world's first green passenger riverboat, including at stop at the Heinz History Center.

A second tour "A Day Out with Frank Lloyd Wright" takes visitors to Fallingwater and Kentuck Knob—both residences that integrate with their natural surroundings according to Wright's design.

Seminar topics include "Rewriting the History of Medieval Wales," "Amy Dillwyn," "Singing the Hymns of Caradog Roberts," "Welsh Identity in North America Today," "Annie Hughes Griffiths," The Flooding of Cwm Tryweryn," "The American Order of True Ivorites," "The History of the American Gorsedd" and much more.

A special addition to the schedule is presenter Dr. Grahame Davies who was a member of the royal household for twelve years as Deputy Private Secretary to the Prince of Wales, later King Charles III. Dr. Davies will talk about "The Welsh Connection to the Coronation" and "Star Poets from Seren."

There is the opportunity to take in the traditional Eisteddfod competitions on Saturday, and the Welsh marketplace, tea room and silent auction all weekend long.

The National Gymanfa Ganu, directed by Jon Rogers, Musical Director of the Dunvant Male Choir, and accompanied by organist David Enlow, round out the busy weekend.
